CALL TO ORDER

-Roll Call - The meeting was called to order by board Chair, Christine Ivory, at 3:07pm and a quorum was present for the transaction of business.

Consent Calendar

- Review and approve the minutes of the Board of Directors meeting on February 19, 2026
- Review and approve SCCAA’s Organization-Wide Expenditure Report as of February 28, 2026
- Current balance/statement of financial position is \$53,511.51 as April 8, 2026.

MOTION: Justine Gill motioned to approve the entire consent calendar, Rick Millhollin seconded the motion. No opposed. Motion passed.

OLD BUSINESS

Organizational Standards and Informational Items

- **Salvation Army presentation/update** – Captain Larry Carmichael reported the following:
 - After years of financial loss, the Depot program has transitioned out, however most residents were able to be placed in permanent housing.
 - Manage eight transitional homes in Linda, called Hope Vista
 - Fresh Friday’s food distribution program at their Yuba City facility serves about 100 households each week. This facility also offers other safety net services includes housing navigation, clothes closet, rent/utility assistance, etc.
 - Currently renovating Yuba City facility to create a commercial kitchen. Anticipate having a grand opening in August

- Currently renovating facility at 410 J Street, Marysville (base of the levee) to offer Family Services safety net services like Yuba City facility, to include food, clothes closet, etc.
 - Annually provide Back to School and Christmas events/giveaways
 - Using former Depot program building to prepare medically tailored meals and deliver on Tuesdays
 - For youth, offer Corps Cadet Program for ages 12-24 that includes leadership training, spiritual growth, civics, opportunity to gain money for school and more, a teen group that has outings, movie nights, games and more, a youth music program that offers instrument training and choir and send kids to camp.
 - Looking into offering retirement planning classes and Jr. financial programs
- **Review SCCAA 2025 Final Achievement Reports to CSD** – Jackie Slade stated the report shows which sub-grantee agency reported in which individual outcome and/or service indicator (about 200) The narrative accomplishment portion focuses on sub-grantee achievements in management changes, program changes to improve service delivery and creative programs to address causes and conditions of poverty. All sub-grantees reported, however only a few were chosen to report to the State.
 - **Review SCCAA 2025 Annual Report for distribution** – Brynda Stranix stated this report is a condensed, easier to read highlight of the 2025 service provider accomplishments, that includes a distribution of funds by category, programs that were funded and a client success story. She asked the group to help share the report for SCCAA exposure.
 - **Complete 2026 Board Member Income Certifications** – Jackie Slade reported she collected completed forms from most of the board members.

Committee Updates

- **Bylaws committee (Brynda Stranix, Justine Gill, Dee Dee Brady)**
 - **Need review and update if needed, then sent to Attorney for the official five-year review** – Jackie Slade reported that per Organizational Standards, SCCAA needs to have their bylaws reviewed by an attorney this year. She asked the group to consider if they wanted any changes to quorum, term limits, etc. She will work with the bylaws committee for review and changes, present to the board for approval of any updates and then forward to an attorney for final review.

 - **Staff Report on 2026-2027 Strategic Plan Activities March/April 2026 update** – Brynda Stranix reported the staff report aligns with SCCAA's Strategic Plan and provides updates for the last two months on programmatic activities by SCCAA management, service providers, other community efforts toward assisting the low-income and progress toward achieving SCCAA's Strategic Plan objectives and key strategies.
 - **Public Awareness/Marketing (Brynda Stranix)**

- **Site Visit** (Kendra Davis, Rick Millhollin, Lonnie Perez, Justine Gill, Christine Ivory, Sharon Foote, Pattra Runge)
 - **Elect a committee chair for 2026** – Jackie Slade reminded the group that last year during the site visit process, the chair had to unexpectedly step down. A new chair needs to be chosen to manage the site visit process, which includes coordinating the committee to complete visits at each of the 10 sub-grantee locations and assuring Board Member Site Visit Forms are completed in a timely manner and legibly. Group discussed. Kendra Davis volunteered to chair the site visit committee, no other board members voiced an interest and no objections were indicated.
- **Community Action Plan** (Full Board)
No report
- **Nominating Committee** (Full Board)
 - **Sharon Foote, District 4 representative, passed away** – Jackie Slade reported that unfortunately long-time board member, Sharon Foote, passed away last month. Group asked to be notified immediately of future occurrences.
 - **Two vacant Low-Income positions since February/August 2025, one District 4 position since March 2026** – Christine Ivory asked the group to try to find potential candidates for the vacant positions.
- **Allocation Committee** (Full Board)
 - **Re-allocation of \$50,000 originally awarded to Salvation Army Depot:**
 - \$25,000 Salvation Army Fresh Friday's program
 - \$15,000 to Bridges to Housing
 - \$10,000 to Sutter County Health & Human Services

Jackie Slade reminded the group that they had allocated \$50,000 in 2026 CSBG funds to the Salvation Army Depot program in November 2025. In January 2026, Salvation Army reported the Depot was closing, disqualifying them for the \$50,000 allocation. SCCAA staff asked Salvation Army to resubmit an application with a new scope of work to be considered by the board to possibly receive the now un-allocated \$50,000.

A decision on the re-allocation of funds could not be made at the February 2026 board meeting so clarifying information was obtained from Salvation Army, and a ballot to eligible voting members of the board was sent via email for a final decision to be made on the \$50,000 allocation.

Christine Ivory read the results of the vote included on the agenda so officially reported in the minutes.

NEW BUSINESS – Discuss service provider presentation for June 2026 meeting –Harvest Healthcare Solutions? – Jackie Slade reminded the group they voiced an interest in having Harvest Healthcare Solutions present at a previous meeting. Group confirmed they wanted a presentation, Jackie to follow.

MEMBER UPDATES

- Rick Millhollin reported there has been an influx of homeless lately and with the closing of Salvation Army Depot and 14 Forward shelters, 114 beds total have been lost. Habitat for Humanity continues to work on the completion of the Life Advancement Center at 916 Plumas Street, Yuba City. Once complete, possibly in June, it will be a one stop campus housing Hands of Hope Day Center, a sobriety center and transitional beds.
- Russ Hogue reported there are 60 apartments at Harmony Village, a Sutter County Permanent Supportive Housing Project for low-income individuals, that is generally full. The facility is semi-secure but unfortunately is not served by Yuba-Sutter Transit. Habitat for Humanity provides transportation on a limited but regular schedule to Walmart, FoodMaxx and Winco.

RE: Staff Report re: 2026-27 Strategic Plan/Programmatic Activities Update May/June 2026

GOAL 1: INDIVIDUALS AND FAMILIES ARE STABLE, ACHIEVE ECONOMIC SECURITY AND ARE SELF-SUFFICIENT

OBJECTIVE: Increase homelessness prevention and reduction services (including financial literacy, rent/deposit assistance)

Support agencies that provide emergency funds for unexpected hardships (ie utilities, rent, car repair, rental deposits, etc)

- \$40,000 in 2026 SCCAA Regular funding was awarded to Bridges to Housing to provide rental deposits, rent payments and other housing assistance to low-income clients.
- \$28,000 in 2026 SCCAA Regular funding was awarded to Sutter County Health and Human Services to provide financial assistance and basic household items to assist individuals transitioning from Better Way Shelter into permanent housing.
- \$20,000 in 2026 SCCAA Regular funding was awarded to Habitat for Humanity to provide financial assistance to low-income Sutter County residents for utilities to help avoid eviction and prevent homelessness.

Support agencies that provide emergency shelter and counseling/education services (including domestic violence services)

- April 2026, Glad Tidings Church announced their renovation of the former Leo Chesney Correctional Facility in Live Oak to Peace of Heaven Children's Paradise, a residential sanctuary for children rescued from sex trafficking. Now in its first of many phases of renovation, its initial focus will prioritize girls, including young mothers, while the broader vision includes expanding care to all survivors seeking refuge and restoration. Their approach will be trauma-informed, relational and restorative, focusing on physical safety as well as emotional, spiritual and practical support.
- May 2026, Twin Cities Rescue Mission in Marysville reported they continue to work toward their expansion of Mission North, which is a 16 bunk women's dorm (32 beds total) and a new intake facility with laundromat.
- \$30,000 in 2026 SCCAA regular funding was awarded to Regional Emergency Shelter Team (REST) to provide emergency overnight shelter, hot meals, hygiene supplies and case management support for unhoused individuals and families during the winter months.

Support agencies that provide affordable legal services to help the low-income obtain or maintain income, housing and medical care

- June 2026, Hands of Hope Center in Yuba City, that offers laundry, showers and other support for homeless families and individuals, reported their monthly service calendar includes free one on one consultation with a Yuba-Sutter Legal Center representative and/or California Rural Legal Assistance representative.
- \$15,000 in 2026 SCCAA Regular funding was awarded to Yuba-Sutter Legal Services for Seniors to provide free legal services and advocacy for low-income persons aged 60 and over in Sutter County to help them obtain or maintain their income, housing and medical care.

OBJECTIVE: Improve access to food and basic needs

Support agencies that provide access to healthy food

- May 2026, Salvation Army reported they are transforming their former pantry space at 410 Del Norte Avenue in Yuba City into a new hub for nutrition-focused health programming and community learning. The anticipated re-opening will be mid-July 2026. The renovated facility will include a commercial kitchen, walk-in refrigeration, and a dedicated community learning space - all designed to support and expand critical nutrition and wellness programming within the community. Once completed, the site will serve as the home base for the:
 - Medically Tailored Meals (MTM) Program
 - Medically Tailored Groceries (MTG) Program
 - Nutrition Education ServicesThe new community learning space will also be available for community partners and groups during select after-business hours, creating additional opportunities for education, collaboration, and community engagement.
- June 2026, Yuba City Unified School District announced 8 Free Summer Meal Sites providing food at breakfast and lunch time for kids 18 and under.
- \$30,754 in 2026 SCCAA Regular funding was awarded to Yuba-Sutter Food Bank to support their food sourcing and partner agency program to help expand access to food and basic needs for low-income residents and the food insecure.
 - June 2026 Yuba-Sutter Food Bank reported the following impact
 - 300,000 pounds of food distributed monthly on average
 - 200,000 pounds of food on average rescued from the landfill each month
 - 50+ active partnerships were managed to serve the community
 - 277,000 meals served monthly on average

Support increased food distribution days/times available to accommodate working families

- Most current Yuba-Sutter Food Bank Food Distribution Schedule indicates the following:
 - There are 13 food pantries in Sutter County, only 3 of which distribute at times convenient for working families.
 - In addition, of the eight USDA distributions/Community Food Giveaways in Sutter County, the following is available for working families:
 - Last Saturday of the month 10am at 850 Gray Avenue, Yuba City

Misc. activities to improve access to food and basic needs

- \$18,000 in 2026 Regular funding was awarded to Sutter County Children and Families Commission to support the Sutter County Diaper Bank that will provide free diapers and wipes to low-income families with young children to help them achieve economic stability.
 - June 26, Sutter County Children and Families Commission's Diaper Bank distribution, 10:00 AM – 11:00 AM at Hope Point Church, 600 N. George Washington Blvd., Yuba City

OBJECTIVE: Reduce the number of at-risk and challenged low-income individuals and families in Sutter County

Support agencies that provide job training programs/skills and education required for employment and/or job advancement

- June 2026, Hands of Hope Homeless Day Center in Yuba City that provides support for homeless families and individuals, reported their monthly service calendar includes free workshops on Job Search Techniques, Resume Introduction, Marketing Oneself, 5 key elements to first impressions.

Support programs designed to promote self-sufficiency, accountability and life skills training

- May 2026, Twin Cities Rescue Mission reported they have turned the modular building at Mission North in Marysville (former 14Forward) into a Training Center and now have chaplains, CPR training, discipleship, AA Meetings, resume` building and job search capabilities among other vital resources. Shadows2Strength teaches CPR classes for FREE to anyone who wants to learn how to save a life on the 4th Monday of every month beginning at noon. If someone wants to receive certification, Shadows2Strength also offers full courses for purchase on the 3rd Saturday of every month from 9:00 am to 2:00 pm.
- \$17,000 in 2026 SCCAA Regular funding was awarded to Child Advocates of Placer, Yuba and Sutter County to support the Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) program that provides support and mentorship for foster youth in Sutter County.

Promote and market the new Yuba-Sutter Transit Mobility on Demand system to assist low-income and mobility challenged individuals access employment and educational opportunities

- May/June-- Yuba-Sutter Transit will be conducting the 2026 Customer Satisfaction Survey, inviting passengers to share feedback on key aspects of their transit experience, including ride comfort, safety, service reliability, and overall satisfaction with Yuba-Sutter Transit. Feedback helps us improve our services and create an even better transit experience for everyone in our community. Participants who complete the survey will be entered into a prize drawing for Yuba-Sutter Transit (YST) travel essentials. The online survey will be available in English, Spanish and Punjabi.
- June 2026, posted on Facebook celebrating the One Year anniversary of Yuba-Sutter Transit's microtransit service to better serve residents without direct access to their fixed routes.

GOAL 2: SUTTER COUNTY IS HEALTHY AND OFFERS ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY

OBJECTIVE: Expand access to health services (including mental, behavioral, physical and alcohol/substance abuse)

Support agencies that provide outpatient medical and behavioral health programs for the low and moderately severe mentally ill.

- June 2026, Casa de Esperanza Hope Haven Counseling & Support Center announced a new drop-in support group designed for teens ages 13–18. The group is open and informal and will focus on managing stress, coping with challenges, building confidence and healthy relationships and more. Will be held weekly on Tuesdays starting July 7th, 3:30–4:30 PM at Hope Haven Training Room, 103 D Street, Marysville, CA 95901
- April 2026, Eagle View Mental Health Urgent Care opened on Plumas Street in Yuba City. They offer same-day support for individuals experiencing worsening psychiatric symptoms that need immediate attention. Open Friday–Sunday from 10am–10pm at 1215 Plumas Street, Ste. 1300, Ste. A.
- \$25,000 in SCCAA 2026 regular funding was awarded to New Day Training Center to provide group and individual behavioral health therapy programs for low-income Sutter County residents who need mild/moderate level therapeutic care and provide substance abuse recovery support.

Support agencies that provide semi-permanent shelter that offer a comprehensive array of services to include mental health counseling and substance abuse programs

- April 2026, Sutter County Health & Human Services announced the construction of a 16-bed residential mental health treatment facility operated by Willow Glen. It will provide long-term residential treatment for individuals from Yuba and Sutter counties with significant mental health needs, including those under conservatorship.
- June 2026, Hands of Hope Center in Yuba City, that offers laundry, showers and other support for homeless families and individuals, reported their monthly service calendar includes free one-on-one counseling and support with a Sutter Yuba Behavioral Health Representative, Harmony Health Street Medicine Team services.

OBJECTIVE: Provide opportunities that improve the quality of life of low-income residents in Sutter County

Support agencies that improve the areas in which we live, including but not limited to: improving safe passages, developing parks, community centers, low-cost housing rehabilitation programs, etc.

- June 2026, Habitat for Humanity reported they are developing a new Accessibility & Aging - in-Place Assistance Program to help low-income homeowners remain in their homes by offering accessibility improvements including wheelchair ramp installations, bathroom grab bars, safety handrails and other minor accessibility modifications. The program is expected to offer 0% interest repair loans up to \$8,000, with projects completed through a combination of volunteer support and Habitat staff oversight.
- May 2026, Salvation Army reported they are transforming 410 J Street in Marysville, the former Depot Family Crisis Center Administrative Offices into a new Family Services Center. Construction is underway, with an anticipated opening in mid-July 2026. Once completed, the Family Services Center will offer:
 - Navigation Assistance
 - Homelessness Prevention Assistance
 - Housing Tenancy Support
 - Emergency Food Boxes

- Enhanced Care Management (ECM)
- A Community Conference Room for collaboration and service coordination

Support the creation of affordable, transitional and permanent supportive housing in the region

- June 2026, Habitat for Humanity reported they are working to prepare future homeowners for Fernwood Meadows, an upcoming affordable homeownership initiative in Linda. They are actively scheduling and conducting pre-purchase housing counseling appointments with interested families. These one-on-one counseling sessions help prospective homeowners understand the homebuying process, review financial readiness, and identify any credit challenges or income barriers that may need to be addressed before applying. For information about pre-purchase housing counseling or future Fernwood Meadows opportunities, contact the Family Services Department at familyservices@yubasutterhabitat.org.
- June 2026 Hilbers reported—The Merriment Village affordable housing project at 428 N. Walton Avenue in Yuba City is well underway. Utilities, storm sewer and water are being installed and building #4, the main campus building with 79 units, is going vertical. This is the beginning of a multi-phase project that will bring 217 affordable homes to families, seniors and veterans.

GOAL 3: PEOPLE ARE ENGAGED AND ACTIVE IN THE COMMUNITY
